Here are Advent Resources to help you to access the Readings for each Sunday in Advent and to ponder on them during the week.

There are also Readings and suggestions for the final few days before we celebrate the Birth of Jesus.

Make this time with God's Word a special time for yourself.

REFLECT ON THE SCRIPTURE

What words or phrases were you drawn to when you read the scripture?

What are those words or phrases saying to you at this time?

How does it make you feel?

What do you feel prompted to do in response to this scripture?


RESPOND WITH PRAYER:

Who do you want to pray for?

What do you want to talk about with God?

Pray one decade of 1st, 2nd or 3rd Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary.

Respond with prayer in other ways that enable you to communicate with God.



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DO SOMETHING:

Send a letter, note, voicemail, email or text to someone.

Contact someone who you think might be struggling, lonely or bereaved.

Tell someone how much you value them and why.

Light a candle for someone who does not yet know God or who cannot practise their faith for whatever reason and pray for them and keep them in your thought and prayers.

Light a candle for someone you know who has died or is ill or struggling - and keep them in your thoughts and prayers.

Create or make something which celebrates one of the gifts God has given you.

2ND SUNDAY OF ADVENT: SUNDAY 6 DECEMBER 2020

First reading: Isaiah 40:1-5,9-11

‘Console my people, console them’ says your God.

‘Speak to the heart of Jerusalem and call to her that her time of service is ended, that her sin is atoned for, that she has received from the hand of the Lord double punishment for all her crimes.’

A voice cries, ‘Prepare in the wilderness a way for the Lord.’



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Make a straight highway for our God across the desert.
Let every valley be filled in, every mountain and hill be laid low.
Let every cliff become a plain, and the ridges a valley;
then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed and all mankind shall see it;
for the mouth of the Lord has spoken.'

Go up on a high mountain, joyful messenger to Zion.
Shout with a loud voice, joyful messenger to Jerusalem.
Shout without fear, say to the towns of Judah,
'Here is your God.'

Here is the Lord coming with power,
his arm subduing all things to him.
The prize of his victory is with him, his trophies all go before him.
He is like a shepherd feeding his flock, gathering lambs in his arms,
holding them against his breast and leading to their rest the mother ewes.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 84(85):9-14

R: Let us see, O Lord, your mercy, and give us your saving help.

I will hear what the Lord God has to say,
a voice that speaks of peace, peace for his people.
His help is near for those who fear him
and his glory will dwell in our land.

Mercy and faithfulness have met;
justice and peace have embraced.
Faithfulness shall spring from the earth
and justice look down from heaven.

The Lord will make us prosper
and our earth shall yield its fruit.
Justice shall march before him
and peace shall follow his steps.



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Second reading: 2 Peter 3:8-14

There is one thing, my friends, that you must never forget: that with the Lord, 'a day' can mean a thousand years, and a thousand years is like a day. The Lord is not being slow to carry out his promises, as anybody else might be called slow; but he is being patient with you all, wanting nobody to be lost and everybody to be brought to change his ways. The Day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then with a roar the sky will vanish, the elements will catch fire and fall apart, the earth and all that it contains will be burnt up. Since everything is coming to an end like this, you should be living holy and saintly lives while you wait and long for the Day of God to come, when the sky will dissolve in flames and the elements melt in the heat. What we are waiting for is what he promised: the new heavens and new earth, the place where righteousness will be at home. So then, my friends, while you are waiting, do your best to live lives without spot or stain so that he will find you at peace.

Gospel: Mark 1:1-8

The beginning of the Good News about Jesus Christ, the Son of God.

It is written in the book of the prophet Isaiah:

Look, I am going to send my messenger before you;
he will prepare your way.

A voice cries in the wilderness:

Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight.

And so it was that John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. All Judaea and all the people of Jerusalem made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in the river Jordan they confessed their sins. John wore a garment of camel-skin, and he lived on locusts and wild honey. In the course of his preaching he said, 'Someone is following me, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to kneel down and undo the strap of his sandals. I have baptised you with water, but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit.'
